Mentoring the Future of Ophthalmology

The Minority Ophthalmology Mentoring program aims to increase diversity in ophthalmology by helping qualified students who are underrepresented in medicine become competitive ophthalmology residency applicants.

In 2020, the program's third official year, we welcomed twice as many students. The 50-member class receives one-on-one mentorship, medical career planning guidance, networking opportunities and access to a variety of educational resources, including monthly virtual sessions.

The program is a partnership between the Academy and the Association of University Professors of Ophthalmology (AUPO).

Virtual Student Engagement Program

Student Engagement Weekend was modified into a four-session virtual program that brought the students together before, during and after AAO 2020 Virtual, the Academy's annual meeting. Participants were introduced to the world of ophthalmology through:

- · panel sessions and breakouts with practicing ophthalmologists and residents
- visits to the virtual expo
- · networking opportunities
- · interview skills workshop

Resources and Tools

- Ophthalmologist mentors were matched one-on-one with Minority Ophthalmology Mentoring students and serve as valuable guides through medical school and residency.
- Many ophthalmology departments identified a champion ophthalmologist to introduce students to the profession and program, as well as help them identify opportunities in ophthalmology at their university.
- All students were provided with full access to Academy educational materials, including textbooks such as Basic Ophthalmology and The Physicians Guide to Eye Care, as well as the Ophthalmic News and Education (ONE®) Network.
- Students preparing for the United States Medical Licensing Examination (USMLE) Step 1 exam were given self-study resources including First Aid, Qbanks and self-assessments. They also participated in an eight-month online prep course.
- New in 2020, all students were invited to monthly Zoom sessions presented and facilitated by
 ophthalmologists. Sessions addressed relevant topics such as preparing for residency, ethics in patient care
 and practice type profiles.


